



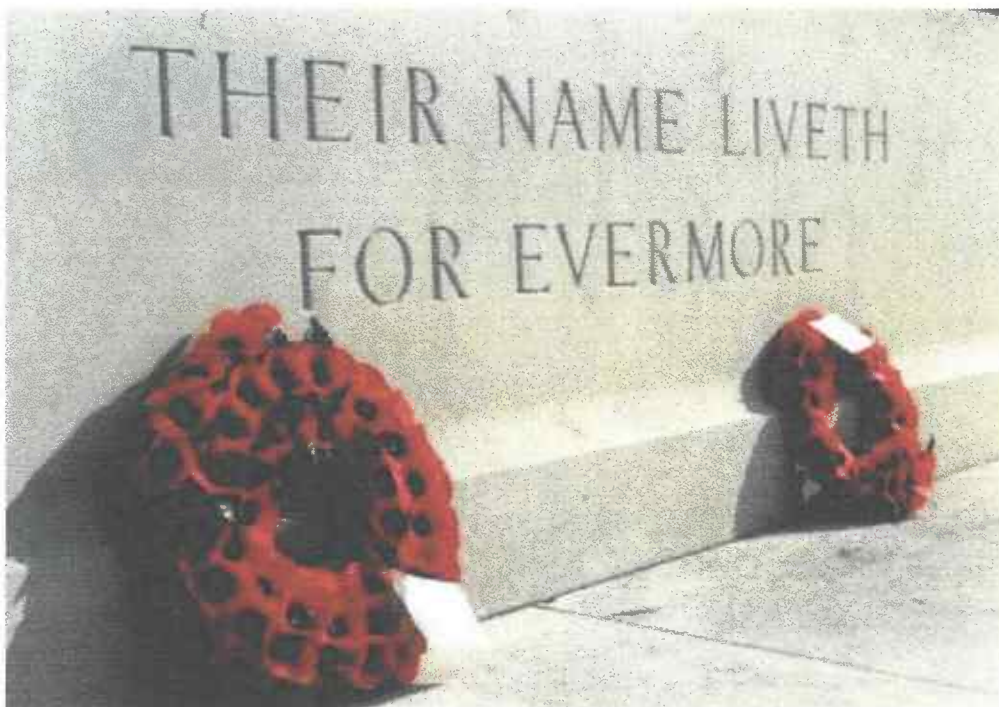

***Corporal of Horse ERNEST HUBERT
STOREY***

*1st Life Guards
who died aged 40 on Friday, 4th June 1915.*

Corporal of Horse STOREY was the son of George and Elizabeth Storey, late of Edgware, Middlesex. Previously served in the 1st (Royal) Dragoons and 13th Hussars.

Ernest Storey was born in 1875, in Edgware, Middlesex, a son of George and Elizabeth Storey.

Ernest was a regular soldier, who enlisted in London, he was based at Shorncliffe Camp, Kent (1901 Census). He served in the 1st (Royal) Dragoons and the 13th Hussars, before serving in the Household Cavalry (The 1st Life Guards), during the First World War.

At the outbreak of WW1, the 1st Life Guards were part of the 7th Cavalry, Brigade, 3rd Cavalry Division, which was formed on 1st September 1914. During the first week of October 1914, the 3rd Cavalry Division were sent to the theatre of war in France, landing at Zeebrugge.

During The Battle of Frezenburg 8th – 13 May 1915, (part of the 2nd Ypres campaign), the 3rd Cavalry Division were on front line duty and were involved in the fighting in this Battle, (mounted troops were used in 1914, but more often than not, were used as infantry from 1914 onwards).

It appears that Ernest was wounded in action, in the above battle and was a patient in the 8th General Hospital, when he died on the 4th June 1915, aged 40.

He is buried in the Boisguillaume Communal Cemetery, Seine Maritime, France, the burial ground contains largely burials from the 8th General Hospital that was quartered in the grounds of a large private house at Boisguillaume. The Cemetery contains the graves of 680 soldiers of the commonwealth forces of WW1.

Ernest was entitled to The British War and Victory medals
